

## PLANTS THAT ATTRACT BIRDS

### TREES:

<b>Apple</b>	many species: some shown below
<b>Black Gum</b>	bluebirds, mockingbirds, robins
<b>Red Cedar</b>	68 species of birds!
<b>Cherry</b>	40 species of birds
<b>Crab Apple</b>	chickadees, cardinals, titmice, waxwings, robins, etc.
<b>Dogwood</b>	18 species, woodpeckers, bluebirds, etc.
<b>Magnolia</b>	Cardinal, catbird, mockingbird, robin, thrashers, woodpeckers
<b>Maple</b>	chickadees, goldfinches, evening grosbeak, nuthatch
<b>Mulberry</b>	12 species
<b>Oak</b>	chickadees,, jay, nuthatch, thrashers, titmice, woodpeckers.
<b>Persimmon</b>	catbird, mockingbird, robin, warblers, waxwings
<b>Pine</b>	11 species, many shown above.
<b>Plum</b>	catbird, jay, robin, thrashers, warblers, woodpeckers
<b>Sweatgum</b>	chickadees, goldfinch, sparrows, starling, wrens
<b>Tulip Poplar</b>	cardinals, goldfinch

### VINES:

<b>Bittersweet</b>	10 species or more
<b>Grapes</b>	10 species!
<b>Virginia Creeper</b>	37 species!
<b>Trumpet</b>	hummingbirds primarily
<b>Honeysuckle trumpet</b>	[native one] hummingbirds especially.

### SHRUBS:

<b>Abelia</b>	hummingbirds
<b>Barberry</b>	quail, robin, sparrows, woodpeckers
<b>Beautyberry</b>	cardinal, mockingbird, quail, robin
<b>Blackberry</b>	bluebird, cardinal, mockingbird, robin, thrashers
<b>Cotoneaster</b>	bluebird, mockingbird, robin, waxwings

<b>Red Osier Dogwood</b>	[native]	35 species!
<b>Eleagnus</b>		30 species
<b>Euonymus</b>		bluebird, robin sparrows, woodpeckers
<b>Holly</b>		8 species
<b>Honeysuckle</b>	[native!, others are invasive]	14 species
<b>Laurel Cherry</b>		bluebird, mockingbird, robin, waxwings
<b>Nandina</b>		mockingbird, robin waxwings
<b>Photinia</b>		mockingbird, waxwings
<b>Privet [Ligustrum]</b>		6 species
<b>Pyracantha</b>		25 species
<b>Rose</b>		10 species
<b>Sumac</b>		15 species
<b>Vaccinium</b>		39 species
<b>Viburnum</b>		41 species
<b>Wax Myrtle</b>	[male and female are separate plants.]	Warblers, etc.

Other shrubs such as azaleas, photinia, and boxwood, when planted as a hedge or grouped together, make good roosting cover for birds as well as nesting sites. For reprints of a list like this see below.
